Helping your teen become a safer driver

Every year nearly 322 teenagers between the ages of 15–19 are killed in car crashes and about 25,375 are injured.¹ Despite safer cars, better roads and countless driving programs, these numbers have stayed fairly consistent for more than a decade. You can help change this.

GET THE CONVERSATION STARTED

As a way to get started, Allstate has created the Parent-Teen Driving Contract. It can help you:

- Outline your teen's key driving responsibilities
- Decide on the associated consequences when those responsibilities are not met
- Define your role in helping your teen become a safe driver

Once you talk over each issue and come to an agreement, fill out the rules and consequences in the space provided. Then sign and date the agreement. Be sure to keep it in a prominent place, like on the door of your refrigerator, so you can re-examine it often and make changes as your teen becomes a more experienced driver.

The graduated licensing process lets new drivers acquire driving experience and skills gradually.² Each province has different laws, so you and your teen should become familiar with them and take them into consideration as you complete the contract. The more you get involved, the more likely your teen will be a safe driver.

According to the Insurance Bureau of Canada, drivers aged 21 and under with less than six months of driving experience have more collisions than drivers with 10 or more years of driving experience.

Alcohol and drug impairment is the biggest killer on our roads. Approximately one third of all drivers killed in Canada had been drinking.⁴

The 7 per cent of Canadians that do not wear their seat belts account for almost 40 per cent of fatalities in vehicle collisions.⁵

Distracted driving is the equivalent of driving after consuming four beers. Taking your eyes off the road for five seconds while driving at 90 km/h is the same as driving the length of a football field completely blind.
